

#### 2021 106th Southwestern Amateur Tournament Summary

The 106th Southwestern Amateur was held June 16-19, 2021, at the Outlaw Course at the Desert Mountain Club in Scottsdale, Arizona. It was the inaugural event for a women's division. 71 men completed on the par 71, 7058-yard layout while the 68 women competed with the same par at 6213 yards. The first two rounds were played in morning and afternoon waves, the men and women alternating waves. For the third and fourth rounds after the cut, play was in a morning wave only with the men off first for the third round and the women off first for the final round. Golf Genius was our official tournament program and included on course scoring for real-time scoring. Volunteers entered three-hole scores directly using the Golf Genius smartphone application.

In its inaugural year, exemptions for the Women's Division were based on rankings: in amateur events (top 300 in the World Amateur Women's Golf Ranking [WAGR], Women's U.S. Amateur and Arizona Women's Stroke Play); in collegiate events (Golfweek and Golfstat rankings), in junior events (Golfweek, AJGA) and special considerations including the champions of the Ladies National Golf Association tournament in Anthem, Arizona.


Approximately 250 invitations were emailed to players and for those players for whom we did not have email addresses, the invitations were provided to their respective college coaches, if applicable. Players who replied were automatically accepted on a first come-first serve basis. Amateurs competing in the USGA Four-ball tournament were invited to apply.

The Women's Division final field of 72 players came from entries representing 17 states, 12 countries, 38 universities and colleges and 10 high schools. The field included 33 players in the top 1000 WAGR with 21 players ranked in the top 500 and of these, 5 ranked in the top 100. We ended with a WAGR power ranking for our women of 498.96, which is quite high. The women's Porter Cup is 250 by comparison.

Exemptions in the Men's Division were based on rankings: in amateur events (top 200 in the World Amateur Men's Golf Rankings [WAGR], top 200 in the Scratch Players Men's World Amateur Rankings [SPWAR] and comparable exemptions, as noted for women, in other men's amateur, collegiate and junior events); top finishers in the 2019 Southwestern Amateur and past champions and top players in the final 2020-21 Troon Saguaro Series and special considerations including the winner of the Annual Future Champions Golf Las Vegas tournament.

Approximately 350 invitations were sent via email in early January with those responding automatically accepted on a first come-first serve basis. From 196 entries, the final field of 72 players came from 15 states, 11 countries, 39 colleges and universities, and 7 high schools. The field included 15 players in the top 1000 WAGR with 3 players ranked in the top 500. Six players were in the top 500 SPWAR. The men ended up with WAGR power ranking of 163, which beat the Rice Planter (161) and Sizzler (101).

There were no housing hosts this year due to COVID-19 concerns.

## JAMES LEOW PERSEVERES, PULLS AWAY TO WIN THE MEN'S SOUTHWESTERN AMATEUR

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. – In the 106th year of the Southwestern Amateur, **James Leow**, an Arizona State junior from Singapore, put in a commanding performance to earn a three-shot win at the Outlaw Course at Desert Mountain in Scottsdale, Ariz.

Leow's win was a long time in the making, after a surgery in December sidelined him during the collegiate spring. A resilient return to the amateur scene made the Southwestern Amateur his second event of the summer after last week's Dogwood Invitational, where he placed 37th.


Some self-actualization and stretching seemed to do the trick this week.

"I knew my game was in the right direction, I was playing the shots I needed to, but my body wasn't quite there. I had one to two days (between the Dogwood and the Southwestern) to stretch it out, get back into it, refresh and play out here."

His quick turnaround resulted in championship-level golf, setting the precedent after a first-round 63 that included birdies on the final four holes. He was tied for lead with Arizona's **Christian Banke** from Danville, California, after the opening round but made the championship all his in the succeeding days.

The final round had Leow starting off in excellent position, three strokes ahead of the field. A thunderous 67-67 in the last two rounds by Oklahoma's **Tucker Allen** from Tolar, Texas, briefly threatened the leader, at one point creating a tie before Leow's back-nine birdies on No. 14 and No. 16 once again separated him from the pack. Allen went five-under through 11 before a bogey on No. 15 set him back at nine-under.

Leow closed it out strong, as a tough birdie miss on No. 17 became no big deal after an excellent drive off of the 18th put

him in great position to attack the pin with a downhill wedge. He would miss another birdie attempt after he got onto the green, but a seamless tap-in for the win proved all he needed.

"I'd be lying if I said there weren't any nerves hitting the tee shot on the last," Leow said. "As soon as I flushed it, it felt really great. A lot of my nerves were kinda put away."

Leow closed with a 70 to finish at 12-under (63-70-69-70-272) for the championship, three shots ahead of Allen (70-71-67-67-275), who was trying to win his third desert tournament this year. The Oklahoma Sooner won the Saguaro and Grapevine Amateurs in the first two weeks of 2021.

Banke tied for third at 6 under (63-72-70-73-278) with NCAA Division II champion **Keegan Bronnenberg** of the University of Indianapolis (69-71-69-69-278) from Muncie, Indiana, and Auburn's **Ryan Eshleman** (71-70-65-72-278) from Vestavia Hills, Alabama.

Scoring was excellent on the difficult Outlaw Course, with nine players finishing in red figures for the championship.


## CHING-TZU CHEN IS THE FIRST-EVER SOUTHWESTERN WOMEN'S CHAMPION

Standing on the 72nd tee at the Outlaw Course at Desert Mountain, **Ching-Tzu Chen** of Taiwan and the University of Oregon had already bogeyed three holes on the back nine and could sense that her lead was shrinking. Then, while waiting on the tee she decided to check the scoreboard to see that her lead was two shots.

"I don't suggest that any player do that", said a smiling Chen afterward.

Her tee shot went wayward to the left, so much so that she had to hit a provisional ball, but Chen didn't let it rattle her any further.

"No matter where my golf ball goes, I know that I tried my best."

Chen was able to find and play her tee shot, but in the meantime, her fellow countrywomen **Ya Chun Chang** of the University of Arizona birdied the 18th in the group ahead, trimming Chen's lead to one.

From there a solid iron found the green, and a two-putt was enough to hold off Chang and get Chen the inaugural Southwestern Women's Amateur title.

"I have struggled a lot the last few years, so I'm glad that I came this far and never gave up", said Chen of her first major amateur win. "My teammates, my coaches and my parents always support me...and I could never get this far without all of them."

In its 106th year, the Southwestern Amateur introduced its Women's Championship. The women's field in year one was strong, with many highly ranked players and all five Power 5 conferences represented.

"I like all the vibes here", said Chen of the newest Major of Women's Amateur Golf. "All of the volunteers are really

nice as are the rules officials." Of the Outlaw Course, Chen agreed with the widely held perception of it being among the most at Desert Mountain, a worthy championship test.

"It's really challenging. The fairways are tight and the greens are tricky too; different from the tournaments and golf courses we play during the season, which is another challenge but I really like it."

Chen shot a final-round 73 to finish at even par (70-73-68-73-284) for the 72 holes. Chang's birdie at the last gave her a 69 and solo second at 1 over (72-70-74-69-285). Arizona State's **Ashley Menne** (74-69-71-73-287) from Surprise, Arizona, and **Ashleigh Park** (75-72-67-73-287) of the University of Texas and Irvine, California, shot matching 73s to tie for third at 3 over.

Canadian **Noemie Pare**, coming off an appearance at the U.S. Women's Open at the Olympic Club, had the round of the championship, a bogey-free 6-under 65 that vaulted her into a fifth-place tie with Chen's Oregon teammate **Hsin-Yu (Cynthia) Lu** of Taiwan and 36-hole co-leader **Ashley Kozlowski** of Purdue from Littleton, Colorado.

#### JAMES LEOW, CHRISTIAN BANKE LEAD THE MEN, NICOLE WHISTON PACES THE WOMEN

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. – The long-awaited Southwestern Amateur has returned. The 2021 historic stop at the Desert Mountain Outlaw Course showcased the continued strength of the men's championship along with the tournament's new women's division.

Wednesday's first-round teed off with the men's division and resulted in a runaway tie at eight-under-par 63 between Arizona State sophomore **James Leow** from Singapore and Arizona grad transfer **Christian Banke** from Danville, California. The in-state PAC-12 rivals fired incredible rounds of 63, with Leow pouring in six birdies on his back nine and Banke's early eagle on the second hole jump-starting his round.

The pair's incredible first day left plenty to chase after, amounting to a five-stroke lead ahead of a three-way tie for third between **Brandon Hoff** from Austin, Texas, **Tony Chen** from China and **Blake Lorenz** from Norman, Oklahoma, all three shooting 3 under par 68.

The Southwestern Amateur introduced its very first women's division with a world-class field that also put up low scores in the triple digit desert heat.

University of Tennessee junior **Nicole Whiston** from San Diego, California, took the solo lead mid-afternoon with a first round two-under 69, carding the only round under 70 on the women's leaderboard. **Ami Gianchandani** from Watchung, New Jersey, and **Ching-Tzu Chen** from Taiwan are Whiston's closest challengers, tied for second at 1-under 70. Gianchandani's two eagles shone in her first-round campaign.

Round 2 of the 72-hole event gets underway Thursday.

## NICOLE WHISTON HOLDS THE LEAD IN THE WOMEN'S DIVISION JAMES LEOW TAKES THE LEAD IN THE MEN'S DIVISION

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. – The women took to the course in the first wave this morning and experienced more favorable weather conditions, slightly cooler with a gentle breeze.

Still holding the lead midway through the Championship is **Nicole Whiston** of the University of Tennessee from San Diego, California, tied today with **Ashley Kozlowski** of Purdue from Littleton, Colorado, at 1 under par (141). One stroke (142) behind is **Ya Chun Chang** from Taiwan. Close on their heels at one over par 143 are Arizona State's **Ashley Menne** from Surprise, Arizona, **Ching-Tzu Chen** of Oregon from Taiwan, and two University of California teammates, **Mika Jin** from Fremont, California, **Kristine Tran** from San Jose, California, and Canadian **Nicole Gal**, who is heading to Ole Miss.

The men played in the afternoon wave and enjoyed calm winds unlike what the women faced yesterday. The temperature continued to be an issue, topping 100 degrees, which is pretty unusual for the Mountain altitude.

Arizona State's **James Leow** from Singapore continued his great play by following yesterday's 63 with a strong 70 to lead the field at 9 under par (63-70-133). **Christian Banke** from the University of Arizona and Danville, California, followed his first day's 63 with a 72 and is now tied for second with **Hazen Newman** of Oklahoma State and Las Vegas, Nevada, (69-66-135) at 7 under par (135).

The Outlaw links-style course is a challenge playing at 6,200 yards for the Women and close to 7,000 yards for the Men. The greens are rolling at 13 on the stemp meter. This links-style course is considered one of the most difficult of the seven courses at the Desert Mountain Club.

Both fields have been cut to 40 players and will compete Friday and Saturday mornings with tee times beginning at 7:30 a.m. through 9:40 a.m. for their respective division championships.

#### CHEN RISES, LEOW DEFENDS LEAD AS THE FINAL ROUND IS SET AT DESERT MOUNTAIN

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. – The action at the 2021 Southwestern Amateur is nearing a close and the race to glory on both the Men's and Women's side is getting hotter than this week's desert sun. **James Leow** from Singapore and **Ching-Tzu Chen** from Taiwan each finished Friday with strong rounds to get into pole position for Saturday's final round.

**Nicole Whiston** of the University of Tennessee from San Diego, California, led the Women's Championship for most of her round before an untimely stretch of bogey, double bogey and bogey on Nos. 15, 16 and 18, dropping her into a tie for fourth at two-over. Her replacement? Oregon's Chen, who went three under on the back nine. Chen's 3-under 68 puts her in the lead by three shots at 2 under heading into Saturday's final round.

**Ashleigh Park** of the University of Texas from Irvine, California, also made a move in round three, shooting the round of the day, a 4-under 67, to get into a tie for second and into the final group for Saturday. She is tied at 1 over (75-72-67-214) with **Ashley Menne** of Arizona State from Surprise, Arizona, who shot 71 (74-69-71-214).

The 36-hole co-leaders, Whiston and **Ashley Kozlowski** of Purdue from Littleton, Colorado, both shot 74 but are still in contention at 2 over (215) and four shots back.

Leow, the Arizona State junior from Singapore, had little trouble maintaining his Men's Championship lead in round three, as cooler morning temperatures helped him assemble another round in the 60s. The 2-under 69 was fueled by three birdies, including a bogey-free front nine. Entering the final round, Leow's 11-under total (63-70-69-202) puts him three strokes ahead of second-place **Christian Banke** of the University of Arizona and from Danville, California, whose 1-under 70 helped him maintain solo second at 8 under (63-72-70-205).

But on Banke's heels in third is a new name – Auburn's **Ryan Eshleman** from Vestavia Hills, Alabama, who surged with the round of the day, a 6-under 65. Eshleman poured in three consecutive birdies to finish his round at 7 under (71-70-65-206) and cap off his charge to Saturday's final group.

**Tucker Allen** of the University of Oklahoma and from Tolar, Texas, is in solo fourth at 5 under (70-71-67-208) after a 67, while **Sam Tidd** of the University of Utah from Meridian, Idaho (66) and NCAA Division II champ **Keenan Bronnenberg** of the University of Indianapolis from Muncie, Indiana, (69) share fifth at 4 under par (209).

The third round saw the best scoring of the championship, with 9 rounds in the 60s in the Men's Championship and 5 in the Women's Championship. Saturday's final round will also be played in the morning, with lower temperatures and scores again promising a pair of exciting finishes.
