### 2022 107th Southwestern Amateur Tournament Summary

The 107th Southwestern Amateur was held June 15-18, 2022, at the Geronimo Course at the Desert Mountain Club in Scottsdale, Arizona. This was the 2<sup>nd</sup> year for a women's division. 68 men completed on the par 71, 7099-yard layout while the 72 women competed with the same par at 6042 yards. The first two rounds were played in morning and afternoon waves, the men and women alternating waves. For the third and fourth rounds after the 36-hole cut, play was in a morning wave only with the men off first for the third round and the women off first for the final round. Golf Genius was our official tournament program and included on course, real-time scoring. Volunteers entered three-hole scores directly using the Golf Genius smartphone application.

Exemptions for the Women's Division were based on rankings: in amateur events (top 300 in the World Amateur Women's Golf Ranking [WAGR], Women's U.S. Amateur and Arizona Women's Stroke Play); in collegiate events (Golfweek and Golfstat rankings), in junior events (Golfweek, AJGA), top 15 & ties in the 2021 Southwestern Amateur Women's Division, and special considerations including the reigning Desert Mountain Women's Club Champion.


Approximately 250 invitations were emailed to players and for those players for whom we did not have email addresses, the invitations were provided to their respective college coaches, if applicable. Players who replied were automatically accepted on a first come-first serve basis.

The Women's Division of 107 total entries came from entries representing 15 states, 15 countries, 52 universities and colleges and 26 high schools. 73 were ranked in WAGR with an average of 956. Our WAGR power ranking (strength of field) was 490 (in 2021 it was 498).

Exemptions in the Men's Division were based on rankings: in amateur events (top 200 in the World Amateur Men's Golf Rankings [WAGR], top 200 in the Scratch Players Men's World Amateur Rankings [SPWAR] and comparable exemptions, as noted for women, in other men's amateur, collegiate and junior events); top 15 finishers in the 2021 Southwestern Amateur and past champions and top players in the final 2021-22 Troon Saguaro Series and special considerations including the reigning South Beach International Amateur Men's Champion.

A different approach to recruiting took place this year, concentrating on college golf coaches of programs west of the Mississippi (PAC12, Big 12, Mountain West, etc). Coaches were told that players who they selected would be automatically invited. This worked on the men's side. We had 11 recommendations, 7 made the cut, 1 was the champion and 3 others were top 10. The coaches gave us some pretty good players. Additionally, approximately 350 invitations were sent via email in early January with those responding automatically accepted on a first comefirst serve basis. The total 218 entries came from 33 states, 17 countries, 100 colleges and universities, and 32 high schools. 121 entries were ranked in WAGR with an average of 1881. 181 were ranked in SPWAR with an average of 3111. Our WAGR power ranking (strength of field) was 191 (in 2021 it was 163).

There were no housing hosts again this year due to COVID-19 concerns.

## DAVIS BRYANT KEEPS HEAD DOWN, GRINDS OUT COMEBACK WIN IN THE 107TH EDITION OF THE SOUTHWESTERN AMATEUR GOLF TOURNAMENT

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. – On Thursday, it was just a personal best. By Saturday afternoon, it was a championship.

**Davis Bryant**, fueled by a second-round 63, steadily climbed the leaderboard during the final 36 holes at Desert Mountain Club to capture the 107th Southwestern Amateur title.

"It was a blast. That was my lowest round in a competitive atmosphere," Bryant said of Thursday's 8-under-par score, which featured nine birdies and an eagle. "I remember when I got to 9 under, I definitely started thinking about that magic number with a five in front of it."

The Aurora, Colo. native wasn't the only player to sign for 63 that day. Arizona State junior **Gabe Salvanera** fired 30 coming in and took a four-stroke lead at the tournament's halfway point because of it. By Saturday, the pair were neck-and-neck to the finish in the final pairing.

Bryant stood on the first tee box at the Geronimo Course two back of Salvanera and an additional stroke behind 54-hole leader **Jaden Cantafio**. At the turn, coming off three consecutive birdies, he had caught Salvanera and overtaken Cantafio. A birdie at 12 briefly gave Salvanera the advantage before Bryant rolled in birdies on two of the next three holes, while Salvanera made two bogeys.

Bryant wasn't checking his phone, so when the winds were whipping up on the 18th tee box, those thoughts weren't racing through his head. "Fortunately for me, I didn't know I had a two-shot lead," Bryant said. "I had been keeping track but I decided to just start focusing on my own game."

Bryant played the downhill shot 185 yards with the hurting wind. He opted for a punch 7-iron. His well-struck shot right of the pin couldn't crest the ridge in the center of the green and fell back to the right nearly onto the fringe, leaving a long birdie try. Salvanera took dead aim and nearly stuffed it for a short look, but it too failed to stay on top of the ledge. After Bryant nestled his lag putt to about three feet, Salvanera narrowly missed his 25-footer which would have forced Bryant to make.

"It was incredible. I'm so happy to have come out on top and be the champion today," Bryant said. "Gabriel and I, and a couple others, were battling back and forth. I had a few loose shots but I took my medicine and trusted my putter, which is usually the backbone of my game."

A fifth-year senior at Colorado State who will play his final season for the Rams in the fall, Bryant has a loaded summer schedule remaining, including a hometown trip to Denver Country Club for the Trans-Miss Championship in July. "I've never actually played Denver C.C. so I'm looking forward to getting in a practice round there next week," he said.

Salvanera settled for a solo runner-up finish following back-to-back 1-over par 72s on Friday and Saturday. The Queen Creek, Ariz. native had only bogeyed three holes through the first two days but managed to make five in his first eight holes in the third round. He battled back, though, eagling the par-5 9th and adding a couple additional birdies on the back side.

UC Davis junior **Lucas Carper** and incoming Oregon State freshman **Rylan Johnson** shared third place at 9-under par, both posting two of just seven rounds in the 60s during Saturday's finale. Carper had the lowest score of the day, a 5-under 66 that has him already thinking about next year.

"When I woke up this morning, I knew it was going to be a different day than yesterday," Carper said. "I've always performed well in this event but I've always come up short. I'm really excited for next year to try again and hopefully take a winning stand at this." Carper struggled to a 75 on Friday but had the confidence that he could turn things around. It resulted in a nine-stroke difference, including seven on the back nine.


Johnson, from the Phoenix suburb of Gilbert, Ariz., shot 2-under 69 to cap off a consistent week where all four rounds were under par. The victorious Bryant was the only other player to accomplish that this week.

Cantafio had two costly doubles on the front side and was quickly outpaced by Bryant and Salvanera, but resiliently went 2 under his last 10 holes and sealed a respectable fifth place finish. The Washington State junior from Tustin, Calif. put together a bogey-free 64 on Thursday and paired that with 68 on Friday to own a one-shot lead with 18 holes remaining.

The field of 68 players played under cloudy skies, 89F and 14 mph SSW winds.

### CAMILLE BOYD IS THE SECOND-EVER SOUTHWESTERN WOMEN'S AMATEUR CHAMPION

After 105 years as a men's tournament, the Southwestern Amateur added a women's championship in 2021. On Saturday, **Camille Boyd** became the second Southwestern Women's Amateur champion. In the inaugural event, the University of Oregon's Ching-Tzu Chen battled unusually high temperatures and a difficult Cochise Course at Desert Mountain to put her name on the trophy with an even-par final score.

This year, the Southwestern Women's Amateur contestants found some relief in the form of lower scoring on the Geronimo Course, and a cloud-covered final morning and afternoon at the Desert Mountain Club, where there were 18 holes to play and a four-shot lead for the field to chase down. It was Boyd who started the day at the top, and it was Boyd that would stay there.

The soon-to-be junior at the University of Washington, who hails from Yorba Linda, Calif., carded a 69 on Saturday—her fourth consecutive score in the 60s—to seal a four-shot victory at 12 under par. She finished as the only player to break par in all four rounds. "It's a pretty prestigious event, and it feels nice to put my name on the trophy as just the second woman," Boyd said.

Saturday's cooler temperatures had a caveat: wind. Players battled the blustery conditions, but Boyd said she didn't notice until the back nine. A misjudged shot at the par-4 16th led to a double-bogey, shrinking her lead to two over a surging **Katie Cranston**.

The diabolical par-3 18th awaited, with the tee box set farther back and the pin placed delicately above a ridge in the center of the green. Cranston's birdie try from above the hole rolled down the ridge and led to a three-putt. Two groups later, Boyd stuffed it to six feet and drained it with a first pump.

Boyd credited her iron play for a consistently strong week at the Southwestern—the first major amateur win of her career. Her signature collegiate performance in a brilliant sophomore campaign was claiming medalist honors at the Juli Inkster Meadow Club Collegiate, shooting a final-round 65 to tie the Meadow Club course record.

She appeared in all 12 events for the Huskies and led the squad in scoring average at 72.8. It earned her a spot in Pac-12 All-Conference Honorable Mention. "I'm excited to get back to Seattle and take a week off," Boyd said.

Cranston's impressive week at Desert Mountain comes on the heels of her breakout victory at the Women's Porter Cup. There, she defeated fellow Canadian Brooke Rivers in a four-hole playoff after birdieing 17 and 18 to force extra holes.

Here in Scottsdale, the tournament was never within her grasp until the back nine on Saturday when she stuck a 3-wood to five feet at the par-5 12th to set up an eagle that pushed her to 8 under for the round. She would bogey two holes coming in but she still backed up a 33 with a 32 and signed for 65. She trailed the leader by five or more shots at the conclusion of each day but rose up to solo second place. "It was a really great day, I had a lot of fun," Cranston said. "This is probably one of the best fields I've played in."

Cranston, a recently graduated high schooler from Oakville, Ontario, Canada, is planning to take a gap year before joining the Auburn Tigers in the fall of 2023.

Third place went to UNLV sophomore **McKenzi Hall**, who was right there towards the end but a bogey at the 15th and a double on 17 ended her chances of catching Boyd. Her third-round 65 earned her a spot in Saturday's final grouping.

Northwestern junior **Jennifer Cai** was next on the leaderboard following a 67 in her final showing. Considering 75 is how the Irvine, Calif. native began her week, a fourth-place finish at 5 under par was redemptive.

Rounding out the top 5 were first- and second-round leader **Grace Summerhays** of Arizona State University and Seattle University senior **Samantha Bruce**, who matched Cranston's 65 on Saturday to secure a notable finish.


### Round 1 of the 107th Southwestern Amateur is in the books

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. – The men teed off first in Round 1 of the Southwestern Amateur Championship at Desert Mountain Club in Scottsdale Arizona. Play was under hot (100F), clear skies with 5-14 mph SW winds.

It was **Shea Lague** who took the early lead in the men's division, shooting an impressive 64 to take a two-shot lead going into the second round of play tomorrow. "Overall, I'm very satisfied," he said. "I hit the ball well, drove it well, and only had one three-putt."

His round was highlighted by a hole-in-one on the fourth hole. "I figured a 7-iron was the club and the two people in front of me hit good shots with it," he said. "I stepped up there, hit a good shot and it landed a little short and rolled right in."

Both Lucas Carper and Cory Bacon had good days shooting 66 and left themselves only two shots back going into Thursday.

The women's division teed off in the afternoon, and it was **Grace Summerhays** who separated herself atop the leaderboard. She got into the clubhouse shooting 64 to give herself a four-shot cushion heading into the second round of play. "I feel like I've been playing pretty solid lately but haven't been able to score as well as I'm playing", she said. "Today was exciting to put it all together." Summerhays is trailed by **Camille Boyd** and **Ting-Hsuan Huang** who both shot an impressive 68 to get in at -3 and four shots behind.

The tournament continues tomorrow morning with tee times beginning at 7:30 a.m. through 9:40 a.m.

### Salvanera shoots 63 to take a three-shot lead after second round Summerhavs maintains the lead in the women's division

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. – It was the women who teed off first to start the second round of the Southwestern Amateur Championship this morning. Arizona State Freshman **Grace Summerhays** (64-71-135) still has the lead heading into the final two days, shooting even par in her second round to stay at -7 for the tournament. "I feel like my score today doesn't quite show how good I was playing," she said. "I made a lot of birdies, just a lot more bogeys than yesterday."

UCLA Sophomore **Ty Akabane** had one of the best rounds of the day, shooting a 66 to move into second place at -6. Washington's **Camille Boyd** had another stellar day shooting 69, which leaves her in solo third place at -5. The low score of the day was UC Davis Freshman **Abigail Leighton**, who shot an impressive 64 to climb into a tie for 5th place at -3. The cut was made by 36 players at +4.

Arizona State's **Gabriel Salvanera** took the lead in the men's division on Thursday afternoon. The Arizona State Sophomore (67-63-130) shot a terrific round of 63 to give himself a three-shot lead heading into the final two rounds. "Today I had more birdie looks and I took advantage of those looks," he said. "I was pretty solid keeping it in play and making some putts."

Washington State Sophomore **Jaden Cantafio** is in second place at -9 after shooting a 64 today. Then, there is a three-way tie for third place with **Shea Lague**, **Davis Bryant**, and **Lucas Carper** sitting at -8. The cut was made at +3 by 40 players.

The second round was played under clear skies with temperatures in the around 100F and SW winds at 5-10 mph.

The tournament continues tomorrow morning with tee times beginning at 7:30 a.m. through 9:40 a.m.

### CANTAFIO SNAGS 54-HOLE LEAD AT SOUTHWESTERN AMATEUR CAMILLE BOYD TAKES COMMAND OF SOUTHWESTERN WOMEN'S AMATEUR

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. – **Jaden Cantafio** grabbed ahold of the Southwestern Amateur lead early in Friday morning's round. The Washington State junior from Tustin, Calif. carded 34 on the front side at Desert Mountain's Geronimo Course, while playing partner and 36-hole leader **Gabe Salvanera** made bogey or worse on five of his opening eight holes.

Salvanera battled back, though, eagling the par-5 9th and adding a couple additional birdies on the back side to nearly catch Cantafio, who shot 68 on Friday and will take a one-shot lead into Saturday's final round.

The pair of Pac-12 juniors fired two of the three lowest rounds of the tournament during Thursday's second round, with Salvanera shooting 30 on the front side en route to a 63 and Cantafio going bogey-free for 64. Colorado State graduating senior **Davis Bryant** matched Salvanera's 63 before turning in 1-under 70 for his third-round score. The trio will be the final group off the first tee, gunning for the title at the 107th year of this historic championship.

"Each day is a new day. Each shot is a new shot," Cantafio said after his round. "As long as you're having fun out there, that's what it's all about. It's pretty fun to shoot 64 and then a 68, so we'll see what happens tomorrow."

Cantafio had his girlfriend Audrey Weir, a midfielder for the Cougars women's soccer team, caddying for him Friday. Desert Mountain's arduous terrain makes using a cart essentially mandatory, so Weir wasn't carrying or pushing his bag. She was reading putts. "She's been reading putts amazingly," Cantafio said. "She doesn't even play golf. She makes me feel really calm and keeps it fun out there," Cantafio added. "Sometimes golf can become more of a grind than fun."

Salvanera's opening nine spelled disaster, as he sat 5 over while standing on the 9th green. That's where things turned a corner. "That eagle putt on 9 really helped," Salvanera said. "I didn't see much fall today and had a bunch of three-putts so making that 15-footer helped a lot."

Scoring was significantly tougher Friday, with just five players signing for scores in the 60s and only another six breaking par. Oregon State incoming freshman **Rylan Johnson** was one of those six 1-under par rounds of 70, and like Salvanera, it took adversity to overcome a potentially detrimental start. After a double-bogey at the par-5 1st

and bogeys on holes 5 and 6, the Gilbert, Ariz. native would rattle off birdies at 7 and 8, followed by an eagle at 9. He sits in fourth place, five back of the lead and a shot clear of first-round leader **Shea Lague** in fifth.

On the women's side, reinforcements had arrived. Not that **Camille Boyd** necessarily needed them, but they certainly couldn't hurt. Her Husky teammate Hannah Elaimy missed Thursday's cut, but stuck around Desert Mountain to join forces with Boyd as her caddie Friday morning. The University of Washington junior from Yorba Linda, Calif. fed off that comforting energy and carded 66 on day three of the Southwestern Women's Amateur. She'll take a four-stroke advantage into Saturday's finale. "It's obviously a fun time when your friend caddies for you, but Hannah knows the course and knows my game," Boyd said. "It was nice to be able to bounce ideas off of her."

Boyd reached the halfway point of the tournament two behind first- and second round leader **Grace Summerhays**, having posted scores of 68 and 69. The pair were joined by UCLA junior **Ty Akabane** in the final pairing, teeing off at 9:30 a.m. at Desert Mountain's picturesque Geronimo Course. Boyd avoided penal fairway misses and rolled in putts enroute to her third straight round in the 60s. "Maybe I missed one or two fairways, but out here if you get off the course you end up in rocks, cacti, bushes, you could be anywhere," said Boyd. "It was nice to give myself a look on every hole."

Boyd said that carrying a four-shot lead into the final round will not affect her approach. "I just need to do the same things I've been doing, stick to the same game plan, and play to the best of my ability without worrying about the rest of the field."

Boyd made headlines this season at the Juli Inkster Meadow Club Collegiate when she shot a final-round 65 to tie the Meadow Club course record and win medalist honors by three for her first individual collegiate title. She concluded her sophomore season appearing in all 12 events and leading the squad in scoring average at 72.8. It earned her a spot in Pac-12 All-Conference Honorable Mention.

The round of the day was turned in by UNLV sophomore **McKenzi Hall**, who edged Boyd by a shot with a third-round 65. She started the back nine with a bang, holing out for eagle at the par-4 10th in spectacular fashion. The shot went in without a bounce, landing directly in the hole. The two got her to 4 under on the round before birdies at 12 and 16 wrapped up a bogey-free performance. She'll join Boyd and Akabane in the final grouping Saturday morning.

Akabane's third round could have gone south quickly after she opened with a double-bogey at the par-5 first, but back-to-back birdies at two and three quickly erased the damage. The native of Danville, Calif. signed for even-par 71 and is tied at 6 under with Hall.

Texas Longhorn junior **Bentley Cotton** jumped into the top-five with a 67 on Friday. She sits in fourth a shot ahead of Arizona State junior **Ashley Menne**.

The tournament concludes Saturday with the leaders teeing off around 9:30 a.m. Tournament results can be found on www.swga.net.
