### GREWAL, CHAISILPRINGRUANG CLOSE STRONG TO WIN 110TH SOUTHWESTERN AMATEUR TITLES

The 110th Southwestern Amateur was held June 11-14, 2025, on the Outlaw Course at the Desert Mountain Club in Scottsdale, Arizona. This was the 5<sup>th</sup> year for a women's division and the 2<sup>nd</sup> year as a member of the Women's Elite Amateur Golf Series. Both divisions had full fields. 72 men competed on the par 72, 7107-yard layout while the 72 women competed with the same par at 6278 yards. The first two rounds were played in morning and afternoon waves, the men and women alternating waves using the 1st and 11th tees. For the third and fourth rounds after the 36-hole cut, play was in a morning wave only. Our 2024 champion Leigh Chien returned to defend. So that division leaders

would finish play at nearly the same times, both the 1<sup>st</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> tees were used, the women off the 1<sup>st</sup> tee and the men off the 11<sup>th</sup> tee for the third round and vice-versa for the final round. Golf Genius was our official tournament program and included a more efficient registration process, and on course, real-time scoring. Volunteers entered three-hole scores directly using the Golf Genius smartphone application.

Director Chris Brauner spearheaded our recruiting effort. In late 2024 he improved our contact list by merging contacts from last year's list with three years of USGA championship qualifiers, two years of WAGR-ranked players, and AmateurGolf.com-ranked players. Then starting in mid-January and throughout the spring, a flurry of emails were sent to players on our contact list focusing on exempt players (WEAGS champions from 2024, top finishers in last year's SW Am, top 300 WAGR, etc.). If a player became exempt (usually WAGR, Scoreboard/Clippd, or AJGA ranking), they were notified. In addition, 25 representatives of international golf organizations were emailed inviting their national team players, as well as a number of college coaches informing them which of their players were exempt. In all, over 2100 players were contacted but the focus was on a group of about 400 to 500 players.

Men were required to have a current index of 1.4 or better. There were 15 categories that were eligible for exemption into the Championship. Exemptions were based on rankings: in amateur events (top 200 in the World Amateur Men's Golf Rankings [WAGR], all exempt for current year's United States Amateur, top 50 in last year's final Men's Elite Amateur Golf Series standings and current year's Arizona Men's Stroke Play Champion); in NCAA Division I, II & III collegiate events (Scoreboard by Clippd); in junior events (Golfweek, AJGA); past champions and top 15 & ties in the last year's Southwestern Amateur and; reigning champion of the Desert Mountain Men's Club, and last year's Arizona Golf Association Men's Player of the Year.

Women were required to have a current index of 3.2 or better. There were 15 categories that were eligible for exemption into the Championship. Exemptions were based on rankings: in amateur events (top 300 in the World Amateur Women's Golf Ranking [WAGR], all exempt for current year's Women's United States Amateur, top 25 in last year's final Women's Elite Amateur Golf Series standings, and current year's Arizona Women's Stroke Play Champion); in NCAA Division I, II & III collegiate events (Scoreboard by Clippd); in junior events (Golfweek, AJGA); past champions and top 15 & ties in last years' Southwestern Amateur; reigning women's champion of the Desert Mountain Women's Club, and the reigning Girl's Champion of the Future Champions National Championship.

Overall, there were 370 total entries, whittled down to 72 men and 72 women for a full field of 144. There were 60 players on the waiting list from which 11 women and 8 men got into the field. This was a deeper and stronger field than last year (128 WAGR-ranked players versus 97 last year) and a diverse field (players from 30 states and 15 countries including the US).

On the men's side, there were 7 players in the top WAGR 400 (3 – 2024). Our men's WAGR power ranking (strength of field) was 221, up from 210 in 2024. Our champion Hartej Grewal's WAGR ranking jumped 515 spots to 1037<sup>th</sup>.

For the women, there was 15 players in the top 300 of which 3 were in the top 100. For the top 700, there will be 34 players (21 - 2024). Our women's WAGR power ranking (strength of field) was 487, up from 467 in 2024. Our champion Pimchompoo "Pinky" Chaisilprungruang's WAGR ranking jumped 33 spots to 78<sup>th</sup>.

There was no organized host housing again this year. Players dealt directly with hosts.

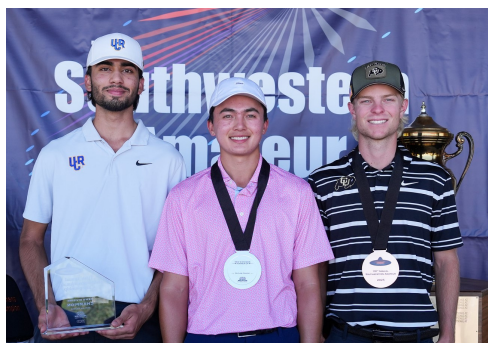
### GREWAL, CHAISILPRINGRUANG CLOSE STRONG TO WIN 110TH SOUTHWESTERN AMATEUR TITLES

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. – Incoming University of Kansas sophomore **Hartej Grewal** (Pleasanton, Calif.) and rising University of North Carolina Charlotte sophomore **Pimchompoo “Pinky” Chaisilpringruang** (Thailand) are heading home as champions of the 110th Southwestern Amateur. Both entered the final round with slim leads and outlasted their challengers to secure the win at Desert Mountain Club - Outlaw Course.

**Men’s Division** - Grewal, whose transfer to Kansas from UC Riverside was announced earlier this week, capped off a spectacular week with his best round of the tournament, a 6-under 66. That marked his fourth consecutive round under par, joining second-place finisher **Matthew Javier** (Canada / Southern Miss) as the only players in either division to achieve that feat. Grewal’s 16-under-par total was two shots clear of Javier, with Grewal’s fellow Pleasanton, Calif. native **Brandon Knight** (University of Colorado) solo third at 12 under.

“Winning means a lot because I came into this tournament hoping to win, and then that is what I did,” Grewal said. “And winning just always feels good. So, I’m just really happy right now.”

Playing in the final group together, Grewal and Javier spent nearly the entire final round jockeying for the top two spots. Grewal, who entered the final round one ahead, opened strong with three birdies and a bogey on the front nine, while Javier kept pace with two birdies of his own. The two remained neck-and-neck through the back nine, matching birdies on Nos. 10 and 11. Grewal noted that the momentum never shifted because he never led by more than two strokes, but he finally seized control on the par-5 16th by topping Javier’s birdie with an eagle.

“I had a one-shot lead going into 16, and I knew I had to make something happen on that hole. I needed something good to happen,” Grewal said. “I hit a nice drive into the fairway, had 248 yards in. My 3-wood goes around 265, so I had to hit a really controlled shot into that pin, shorten my club, and shorten my stance. I set up a nice little fade and it did exactly that and hit it to one foot for eagle.”

**Charlie Wylie** (Houston, Tex. / TCU) and **Kentaro Nanayama** (Indonesia / Purdue University) rounded out the top five at 10 under par.

**Women’s Division** - Chaisilpringruang stayed calm under pressure, and like Grewal never gave up her lead. She capped off the final round with a steady 3-under 69 – her third straight sub-70 round – that featured two birdies on both nines. Her four-day total of 9-under 279 was two strokes clear of 16-year-old **Kaili Xiao** of China and three ahead of **Makayla Tyrrell** (Southlake, Tex. / University of Oklahoma) and **Amy DeKock** (Palm Desert, Calif. / University of Kansas).

Those three chasers all got as close as one behind at various points during Saturday’s final round, but the player who refers to herself simply as “Pinky” put the tournament away on holes 14-16, playing them two under while both Xiao and DeKock fell away with bogeys on the par-3 15th hole.

National Junior Team member **Amelie Zalsman** (St. Petersburg, Fla.) and recent U.S. Women's Four-Ball champion **Natalie Yen** (West Linn, Ore.) all tied for fifth at 4 under par.

"It means everything to me because I would want to make my team (University of North Carolina Charlotte) proud," Chaisilpringruang said of winning the championship.

"I felt stressed, I felt pressured, but I told myself to be excited because you are what you tell yourself to be.

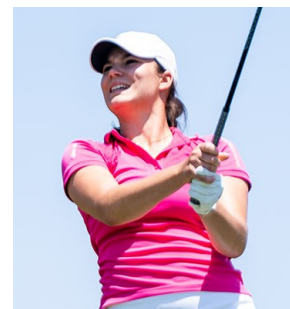
## Round 1 Summary – June 11

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### EIDHAGEN-HARROUCH LEADS WOMEN'S DIVISION WITH 64; THREE MEN TIED AT 67 IN ROUND ONE

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. – **Maria Eidhagen-Harrouch** (-8), a recent graduate transfer to the University of Georgia, holds a two-shot lead after the opening round of the 110th Southwestern Amateur, while **Camden Braidech, Luke Haskew and Charlie Palmer** (-5) co-lead the men's division at Desert Mountain Club's Outlaw Course.

Eidhagen-Harrouch had a goal in mind coming into today: six under, matching the lowest round of her career. She delivered and then some. The Swedish native who represents Morocco kept a clean card, notching six birdies over the first 17 holes. Then came the cherry on top; she choked down on a 9-iron from 142 yards on the par-4 18th, landed it one foot from the hole and watched it roll in.

"It was really fun," Eidhagen-Harrouch said of the round. "I played here last year, so I felt like I had a good game plan, and I just tried to stick to it."

"(Shooting a bogey-free round) makes my confidence a lot higher," said Eidhagen-Harrouch, who finished T27 in the first [Women's Elite Amateur Golf Series](#) (WEAGS) event at Sea Island two weeks ago. "I feel like my game has been there, but I haven't seen any results. It's just so nice to get the results on the scoreboard."

Unlike the women's division, the men did not have a runaway leader, as two strokes separated the top 11 players. University of Chattanooga's **Camden Braidech**, Louisiana State University's **Luke Haskew** and Princeton's **Charlie Palmer** fired 5-under 67s to tie for the lead after the first round.

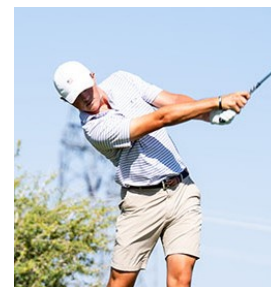

A Scottsdale native, Braidech is no stranger to the Outlaw Course. As a 15-year-old, he finished runner-up at the Arizona Amateur, taking the championship match down to the 17th hole. His familiarity with the course helped him get out to a strong start today.

"It felt pretty straightforward out there," Braidech said. "A lot of fairways, a lot of greens. Nothing too crazy, I just kept it in play. Putts were falling today, and everything seemed to kind of go my way."

For Haskew, his strong opening round didn't come without adversity. The Baton Rouge native bogeyed the first hole but rebounded with six birdies — something he's grown used to recently.

"Golf has kind of been a struggle for me the past year and a half. I've had a good bit of hardship so it's kind of easy to deal with just one bad golf shot nowadays," said Haskew, who does have good memories in the Southwestern Amateur, finishing second here two years ago while shooting a course-record 62 on the Cochise Course.

"In college golf, I hadn't really seen anything great in a while, so I'd say you just have to figure out what works for you and just stick to that plan," Haskew said. "When you're preparing for an event and you step up on that first tee, you just remind yourself how much work you've put in and just let yourself go."

Palmer drained two birdies in the final three holes to jump into a tie for the lead. A Paradise Valley, Ariz. native, Palmer knows how to manage a desert golf course like Outlaw.

"I'm definitely used to desert golf, growing up here for 10 years," Palmer said. "Especially in the wind, I think I hit it really straight. You don't really need to overpower it; the ball goes far enough anyway. I didn't hit too many drivers. I just hit whatever else I was comfortable with and attack with a wedge in my hand and otherwise, try to make pars."

## Round 2 Summary – June 12

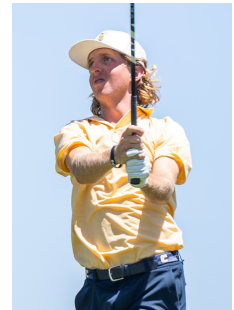
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### BRAIDECH TAKES SOLO LEAD; EIDHAGEN-HARROUCH PULLS AWAY AT THE 110TH SOUTHWESTERN AMATEUR

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. – With a 4-under 68, **Camden Braidech** of the University of Tennessee Chattanooga moved to 9 under and into the solo lead at the halfway point of 110th Southwestern Amateur Championship. In the women's division, **Maria Eidhagen-Harrouch** of the University of Georgia extended her lead to five shots, gutting out a 2-under 70 in a breezy second round on Desert Mountain Club's Outlaw Course.

With the windy conditions impacting play, Braidech admitted that Thursday's round was more of a grind than the day before. After starting strong with two early birdies, he gave back strokes with a pair of bogeys to close the front nine and turned at even par. But he bounced back on the inward nine, carding five birdies, including a 25-foot putt to close out the round. For Braidech, it was about knowing that putts would begin to fall if he trusted in his game.

"Knowing that as the day goes on, stuff will start dropping. Just stay in it, keep an even head, and see what happens at the end," Braidech said. "I wouldn't say there was a huge momentum shift. It felt like, for the most part, I was playing similarly (to yesterday), but some putts started to drop, and I went from even to four under."

Despite two impressive rounds from the Scottsdale, Ariz. native, his lead remains slim going into moving day – just one stroke ahead of **Kentaro Nanayama** of Purdue University and two clear of **Luke Cushman** (Boise State) and **Johnnie Clark** (Oklahoma State), a fellow Arizona product from Mesa.

Several players in the men's field made a run at the tournament's low round, but it was **Tyler Spielman** (Auburn University) who claimed the honor with a scorching 8-under 64. Close behind were the **Hunter Swanson** (University of Colorado) and **Andrew Ramos** (University of Oklahoma), who each carded impressive 7-under 65s.

Despite the tougher conditions, Eidhagen-Harrouch posted another stellar round, a 2-under 70, to widen the gap to five strokes over **Natalie Yen**, the reigning U.S. Amateur Women's Four-Ball champion and a Texas A&M commit. **Makayla Tyrrell** (University of Oklahoma) and **Yu Chu Chen**, an Oklahoma State commit who finished runner-up here a year ago, share the third spot at 4 under.

For the tournament leader, patience has paid off.

"I think with this course you have to be a little patient because there will be opportunities," Eidhagen-Harrouch said of the Outlaw Course. "Some par-5s are gettable. There's that drivable par-4 (No. 14). So, I think looking forward to those holes helps you through the round."

The low round of the afternoon was a 4-under 68 by **Pimchompoo "Pinky" Chaisilprungruang** of the University of North Carolina Charlotte, who moved into a tie for 5th at 3 under par.



After today's round, both fields were narrowed to the low 36 scores and ties. On the men's side, 39 players advanced with the cut falling at even par (144). The women's cut fell to +4 (148), with 38 players advancing to the final two rounds of the championship.

The third round starts at 7:30 a.m. with the women's field teeing off first, followed by the men. The order will then be reversed for the final round on Saturday.

## LEADERBOARDS FLIP AS GREWAL AND CHAISILPRUNGRUANG TAKE LEADS INTO THE FINAL ROUND

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. – Moving day at the 110th Southwestern Amateur lived up to its name on Friday, with new leaders emerging in both the men's and women's divisions. On the women's side, the **Pimchompoo (Pinky) Chaisilpringruang** of Thailand and the University of North Carolina Charlotte fired a 3-under round to take a two-shot lead heading into the final day. In the men's division, **Hartej Grewal** of the University of California Riverside surged to 10 under with a 5-under third round.

Chaisilpringruang began the day seven shots off the lead and struggled to find her rhythm early, opening with a string of pars and a lone bogey on No. 6. But she caught fire on the back nine with birdies on four of five holes from Nos. 12 to 16 — highlighted by a 70-foot putt.

"I got so lucky today," Chaisilpringruang said. "I holed out a 70-foot putt and that made me feel so happy."

Chaisilpringruang leads **Amy DeKock** of the University of Kansas and 16-year-old **Kaili Xiao** of China by two strokes.

The shot of the day was turned in by overnight leader **Maria Eidhagen-Harrouch** of Morocco and the University of Georgia, who aced the 12th hole from 170 yards.

"I was a little in between clubs, but I decided to go with my 9-iron," Eidhagen-Harrouch said. "I hit a really good shot, and I didn't see it go in and no one reacted, so I was like, 'Okay, it's probably going to be pretty close.' Then I came up to the green and I'm like, 'I don't see my ball,' and then I just ran to the hole and found it — and it was in the hole."

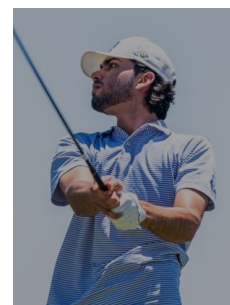

Eidhagen-Harrouch started the day with a five-shot lead, but she got into big trouble at the par-5 2nd hole, making a 9 and eventually losing her lead. The ace and a birdie two holes later put her back on top, but she dropped three strokes coming in and fell into a five-way tie for fourth, three shots back at 3 under.

In the men's division, several players posted low rounds and made big moves up the leaderboard, but it was Grewal's clean scorecard, with five birdies, which erased a five-shot deficit and separated himself from the pack. After being in the hunt for the first two days, Grewal's patience paid off.

"I actually felt really confident on the third day. The first two days taught me how to read the greens and to keep the ball in play, so all I did was hit the fairways, hit the greens, stayed patient, and made putts," Hartej said. "My mentality is really good. I'm really confident right now because I love the course, I like how it's playing and it's setting up really nicely for me, too."



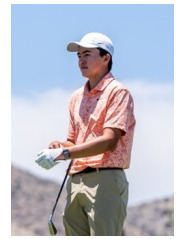

Another low round came from **Matthew Javier** of Canada and the University of Southern Mississippi, who jumped into second place with a 6-under 66. Tied with him at 9 under is **Parker Paxton** of the University of Colorado.

The round of the day was an 8-under 64 from **James Watney** of Fresno State, which tied Tyler Spielman for the low round of the championship. Watney enters the final round tied for fourth at 8 under par with **Kentaro Nanayama** (Indonesia / Purdue University) and **Chi Chun Chen** (Taiwan / University of Houston).

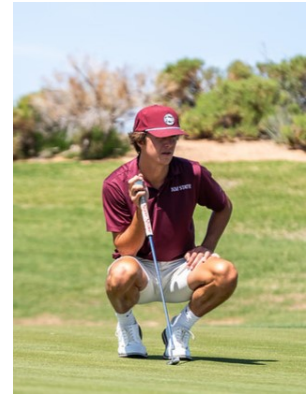
